

# FY2018 Detroit Continuum of Care Project Priority Ranking List

September 11, 2018

## **Project Ranking Policies**

The Detroit CoC Board approved preliminary project ranking policies on June 4, 2018 prior to the release of the FY2018 CoC Program Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA). The final policies were approved by the CoC board on August 6, 2018 and may be accessed via HAND's website <u>here</u>. The policies were approved with the following language (in italics). Also given are actions taken in response to this policy language:

## Final Ranking List Review and Recommendation

Following the submission, review, and scoring of all renewal and new project applications.... Values & Funding Priority Committee may recommend to the CoC board that a project(s) that would have been in Tier 2 because of the ranking policies instead be placed into Tier 1. If the Committee chooses to move a Tier 2 project up to Tier 1, it will need to provide rationale for the recommendation. The Committee will present its final recommended project ranking list to the CoC board in accordance with the timeframe required by HUD. The CoC board will make the final decision on the project ranking list.

### Values & Funding Priorities Committee Recommendation

Following a review of the ranked projects, the Values & Funding Priorities Committee did not recommend that any project placed into Tier 2 instead be placed into Tier 1. The CoC Board approved this recommendation.

#### **Reallocation**

In May 2018, Detroit Rescue Mission Ministries requested to voluntarily relinquish two renewing PSH projects. Funds from one of these projects, Maranatha, were able to be reallocated and are being used to fund the three new reallocation projects. The funds from the other project, Compassion Village, were unable to be reallocated because this was a new project that had not been renewed.

#### Acceptance of Projects for Ranking

#### Renewal Projects

Renewal project applications were due to the Collaborative Applicant on June 27, 2018. The renewal projects were reviewed and scored according to established scoring criteria. Following receipt of renewal project scores, projects could submit an appeal in accordance with the <u>appeals policies</u>. Renewal projects were ranked following the completion of the appeals process.

#### New Projects (non-Domestic Violence Bonus)

A competitive application process was held for new project funding. New project applications were due to the Collaborative Applicant on July 20, 2018. Twelve applications, requesting a total of \$5,226,798, were received in response to the Request for Proposals (RFP). Following the new project review process, the Detroit CoC Board approved seven new non-Domestic Violence project applications to be ranked and submitted for funding. Applicants were notified via email on August 31, 2018 if their new project application was selected for submission to HUD.

#### New Domestic Violence Bonus Funding

A competitive application process was held for a new opportunity to fund a new project using a pool of funding called "Domestic Violence Bonus" funding. Projects funded with these dollars will be specifically targeted to persons fleeing domestic violence. New project applications were due to the Collaborative Applicant on July 20, 2018, and applicants could apply for a Coordinated Entry SSO, Rapid Rehousing, or the joint Component Transitional Housing-Rapid Rehousing (TH-RRH). The CoC can only submit one of each project types. Four applications, requesting a total of \$2,743,011 were received. All applications were for the TH-RRH component type, meaning the CoC could only select one of the four applications submitted. Following the new project review process, the Detroit CoC Board approved one of these projects to be ranked and submitted for funding. Applicants were notified via email on August 31, 2018 if their new project application was selected for submission to HUD.

# **Ranking of Consolidated Projects**

Two agencies (Detroit Rescue Mission Ministries and Southwest Counseling Solutions) are taking advantage of a new opportunity HUD is allowing and are consolidating several renewal projects. Per HUD's instructions, the consolidated projects must be ranked using one of the ranking numbers given to one of the individual projects that make up the consolidated project. If HUD does not fund the consolidated project, it may fund one or more of the individual renewals. The consolidated projects will be ranked using the same ranking number as the highest-ranked individual project.

The consolidated projects are shown in the accompanying ranking list ranked as C#, with the number being that of the highest-ranking individual project. Notes at the bottom describe the individual projects included in each consolidated project.

Two "cumulative total" columns are given to demonstrate two different scenarios: one, if HUD funds only the individual projects and not the consolidated projects; the other, if HUD funds the consolidated projects but not the individual projects. As can be seen, the ranking of consolidated projects does not impact which projects fall into Tier 1 or Tier 2. Additionally, agencies consolidating their projects are not receiving additional funding, as HUD will fund *either* the consolidated project *or* the individual projects.

## Projects Straddling Tier 1/Tier 2

Once projects were ranked up to project #49, there was only \$89,839 left in Tier 1. Typically, the CoC would review the project feasibility at this amount to determine which project should be ranked next straddling the line. However, as this is a relatively small amount of funding no project close to the Tier 1/Tier 2 indicated it would be feasible at that amount. Therefore, the CoC board made the decision to continue ranking the projects in order according to project score and type. This resulted in the Southwest Counseling Solutions RRH project (the next ranked project) as straddling the line.

## Funding Available & Requested

\*\*The Permanent Housing Bonus (PHB) amount is used to calculate a CoC's Tier 2 amount; new projects funded with the PHB dollars, however, may be placed in either Tier 1 or Tier 2

HUD will fund Tier 1 projects according to CoC score. HUD will fund Tier 2 projects according to both the CoC and the project score, as described in the FY2018 CoC NOFA.

## Selection of Domestic Violence Bonus Project

HUD may choose to fund the Domestic Violence Bonsu project using either Domestic Violence Bonus funding or Permanent Housing Bonus funding. If the project is funded with Domestic Violence Bonus funding, all other projects ranked below this project will be bumped up in the ranking list.
